Free Press Staff Reporter THREE cases in which illegal abortions were performed in Singapore by the use of "abortion sticks" are reported in the latest issue of the journal published by the Alumni Association of the King Edward VII College of Medicine.

All three patients died in the General Hospital after developing tetanus. After one of the deaths, information was obtained that a woman had performed the abortion. A trap was set by the Police and an arrest was made.

The journal says that the "abortion sticks' used in such cases have been traced to the plant cheraka merah (plumbago rosea).

The cases show the dangerous association of tetanus infection by the use of such sticks in abortion

In one case, a 29-year-old Filipino woman, who was pregnant, was admitted into hospital and gave the history of having had the assistance of a Malay woman in producing abortion. She developed tetanus and died in health. ed tetanus and died in hospital.
