SELANGOR NEWS.

(Government Gazette, FEB. 16TH.)

MR. W. A. Dyer, Foreman of Works, Kuala Langat, assumed duty on the 6th February. Mr. L. B. Von Donop has been appointed First Clerk, P. W. D., Head Office, on six months' probation from the 30th January.

Mr. O. F. Stonor, Assistant District Officer, Selangor, has been granted one month's vacation leave from the 21st February, 1893, to be followed by four months' leave on half-pay. Mr. J. R. O. Aldworth, Assistant District Officer, Rawang, reported his return from leave and resumed duty on the 6th February.

The Steam Boilers (Ashore) Inspection Regulation, 1893, is published in the *Gazette* in Chinese.

It is notified that the construction of the Ulu Selangor Extension Railways, commenced by Messrs. Campbell and Co., will be completed by the Selangor Government Railway Department.

The following changes will be made in the office of the Resident Engineer for Railways. Mr. D. J. Highet, Chief Assistant Engineer, Rawang, to be Chief Assistant Engineer, Kuala Lumpur, and to act for the Resident Engineer during his absence. Mr. A. Snell, Traffic Superintendent, to take up the duties of Assistant Manager in addition to his other duties.

Mr. N. W. Roy to be Chief Agent for the construction of the Ulu Selangor Extensions (Serendah and Kuala Kubu Sections).

Messrs. S. Coen and W. D. Fisher to be Assistant Engineers, Ulu Selangor Extensions (Serendah and Kuala Kubu Sections).

Mr. G. C. Bellamy reports from Kuala
Selangor:—

Jeram has not been much troubled by ele-
phants since the night Rajah Dolah and
others, including myself, attacked the herd
and drove it off. A large rogue has, however,
been paying rather frequent visits to the kam-
pongs near Bukit Jeram, but as he is not
very regular one scarcely knows how to
tackle him. It is impossible to follow ele-
phants through the swamp, which extends as
far as Bukit Panjang, so that all one can do
is to lay in wait at night when these brutes
come down to feed. The herd we attacked
crossed the country to Pasangan and has
lately been damaging the crops both there
and at Api-Api.
