

Distribution of 50 Per Cent. for the Year.

The report of the directors of the Highlands and Lowlands Para Rubber Company was to be submitted at the fifth annual meeting to be heid at the London Chamber of Commerce on April 27. The report states:—

The price of rubber varied very considerably throughout the past year. Last April a parcel of the Company's smoked rubber was sold at the record price of 12s. 10d. per lb., while the Company's rubber of the same grade was sold last January at 5s. 7½d. per lb. The average price realised for the year's crop was 7s. 7½d. per lb., or 7s. 1½d. per lb. net, as compared with the following average net prices for the three previous years:—

In April, 1910, the Company sold to the Ayer Kuning (F. M. S.) Rubber Company, Limited, some 6,800 acres of the large Ayer Kuning block on which a full report by Mr. R. W. Harrison was incorporated in the directors' report for 1909. The land sold comprised a planted area of 1,532 acres. The consideration received by this company was 245,000 in cash and 51,666 fully paid shares of £1 each in the Ayer Kuning (F.M.S.) Rubber Company Ltd. These shares were distributed to shareholders in this company as a bonus, in the proportion of one Ayer as a bonus, in the proportion of one Ayer Kuning share to every eight shares held in this company and the shareholders in the parent company were also given the opportunity to subscribe at par for one Ayer Kuning share for every four shares held in

A further area of about 80 acres on the Highlands division was cleared at the end of the year, and has since been added to the planted area.

Weeding.—The amount spent on weeding on the Highlands and Batu Unjor divisions in the course of the year was \$16,622, which works out at \$7.61 per acre per annum, as compared with an expenditure on the two divisions of \$8.98 per acre per annum during 1909. On the Midlands division, where the rubber is still young, the cost of weeding was naturally considerably higher than on the two older divisions.

Management.—As indicated in the direc-

Management.—As indicated in the directors' report for 1909, the management of the Highlands and Batu Unjor divisions was taken over by Mr. Greenhill and Mr. Buxton respectively, on the retirement of Mr. A. B. Lake. The Board have appointed Mr. R. Davison, manager of the Midlands division. Mr. H. R. Quartley, the manager of the Seafield Rubber Co., Ltd., acts as visiting agent for all three divisions.

RUBBER MANUFACTURE.—In the course of the year three additional rubber mills were erected on the Highlands division. Further, a new engine house was built on that division, in which a suction gas engine and six rubber mills were put up, in order to deal successfully with the increased crop. A factory equipped with a suction gas engine and four rubber mills has been erected on the Midlands division.

Labous.—The health of the coolies on the Highlands and Batu Unjor divisions has always been excellent. The company has, during the year, constructed on these divisions six sets of new coolie lines of 20 rooms each at a cost of about £1,300, and also six smaller sets of lines. The water supply has been improved on a plan approved by the Government. Government.

The health of the rubber force on the Midlands division has not been satisfactory, but the board have recently appointed Dr. Longson as medical superintendent to the estate. Dr. Longson will reach the estate next month, and it is hoped that under his care the health of the staff and labour force will undergo a very considerable improvement.

No extension of the planted area on the Midlands division was made during the year, but a great deal of work was done in checking the spread of Fomes and removing timber from the plantations, in order to prevent the return of this pest. Recognising the importance of this work, the Board ordered it to be carried out on the two older divisions as well as on the Midlands division.
